

Master's Annual Address

Susan M Noah State Master

Introduction

The Oregon State Grange has met in Pendleton four times previous to this session. We met here in 1933 when Ray Gill was Master, in 1956 with Elmer McClure, in 1965 with Allen Wheeler, who was Master of the Oregon State Grange when I took my 6th degree, and finally just six years ago with Sister Phyllis Wilson, the first woman to be elected Master of the Oregon State Grange. In looking back through our proceedings of these sessions I see a common theme of change, with the agricultural community facing great odds. I believe that this year is no less so. Certainly these times present opportunities for the Grange to show ourselves to be relevant and thoughtful, an organization whose members take pride in our nearly 150 years of the promotion of agriculture.

Agriculture

Out of the 435 Congressional Districts in the United States, Oregon's Second, the District we are in this week, ranks 32nd in total farm operators, with over 22,000 farm operators and over 13,000 farms. Like the Grange itself Oregon's history is rooted in Agriculture and remains a key sector of Oregon's economy. We produce more than 225 different crops and export to countries all over the world, including Canada, Japan, Yemen and China. Agriculture and food products are the second largest exports in terms of value and first in terms of volume. 75% - 80% of Oregon products leave the State and between 35% and 40% leave our country. One in every eight Oregon jobs is Ag related. Of the top 10 Ag commodities in Oregon five are grown or raised here in the Columbia basin. Just a few miles from here is located one of the largest onion producers in the United States, River Point Farms. They utilize sustainable growing, including conservative irrigation systems and solar technology.

A short time ago, agriculture was something taken for granted. Consumers simply went to the grocery store and purchased their needs for breakfast, lunch and dinner. No thought was given as to where this abundance of food products had come from. But consumers these days want to know how their food was grown, where it came from, and every aspect of what produced that wonderful steak or the after dinner pastry, or the noodles in your neighbors pot luck dish he or she brought to the Grange meeting, right down to the taking care of the laborers needs who harvested the blueberries.

Education

As Grangers we have an obligation to continue the precepts set by our Founders and work at educating our members and our communities. The Grange has long held education in high esteem. Passages from our installation remind the Master to encourage the education of the children and "to plead that they be not employed in the arduous labors of the field, before their minds have received that gentle care and training which enliven, explain and dignify labor." Currently the legislative policy handbook of the Oregon State Grange contains many references to our support of a quality education, from supporting funding for Head Start and other pre-School programs to seeking adequate funding of our Land Grant Colleges. We especially support programs such as FFA and 4-H, and we want to see vocational agricultural programs continue, to encourage the education and experience gained to keep agriculture strong and moving. Our policy on early childhood education via programs such as Head Start

goes hand in hand with the Oregon Department of Education. Their research shows that the most effective way to reduce the number of children who will eventually drop out of school is for them to receive a quality early childhood educational experience. I know there are many Grangers who take an active interest in their local schools through various volunteer programs.

Internally, I believe a well-planned Lecturer's program is essential to keeping our own membership informed. All of our officers are important to the running a Grange, but those holding the office of Lecturer, have a special place in the Grange. They can be our teachers, our playmates, our inspiration and our fun. They encourage the young and occasionally they bring a smile of remembrance to the not so young. In all things they labor for the good of the Order.

Legislation

Last week the Supreme Court of the United States handed down two landmark decisions. They upheld the provision in the Affordable Care Act to allow individuals in those States using Federal exchanges to continue to receive the tax credits afforded them by this act, thus preserving their health care coverage. And, in another decision they deemed marriage a right for everyone. These decisions will continue to have an impact on our lives for years to come.

Legislation in our own state will see the legalization of marijuana by the end of this week. What this will mean to the citizens of Oregon has been speculated about for years. But I am more interested in what it could mean to our Granges. In Washington this past year marijuana sales were being conducted by renters out of a Grange hall. Perhaps they had all their paperwork in order and I am assuming they were not breaking any laws, but have we as an organization given any thought about what we will do if faced with a similar scenario?

2015 is certainly a year of change. On both a State and National level we have witnessed social change at an overwhelming rate. Could this be what our forefathers felt following the civil war when a young nation was growing and changing rapidly? The Grange was there to help the farming community rebuild and to help our families repair the bitterness of the war. We are still here and we are still making a difference to farmers, to consumers, and to families.

Community

It is estimated that 62.6 million Americans volunteered nearly 7.7 billion hours last year. In Oregon over 34% of residents volunteer ranking us 10th among the 50 states and Washington DC. Research shows that Oregonians participate in all areas of volunteerism, but the most is concentrated in the Education, Religion and Social Service areas. However when asked if they participated in a service or civic association, 89.7% do not. As members of the Grange we are positioned to not only help as the individuals listed in these statistics, but on a larger scale we also come together to impact our communities as a group of dedicated volunteers. As in the words of Margaret Mead, "A small group of thoughtful people could change the world. Indeed it is the only thing that ever has." Even our smallest Granges are able to make an impact on their community. I know our Community Service Chairman will agree that our Grangers are taking on more than their fair share of service. It is said that Volunteering and civic engagement are the cornerstone of a strong nation. It is also the cornerstone of a strong organization like the Grange. Since 1867 Grange members have been working to better their communities. Not just through community service and volunteering, but through legislative action and civic duty.

Conclusion

I was intrigued by looking back at the Masters Address to the 1915 Oregon State Grange Session held in Tillamook. The State Master at that time was Brother C.E. Spence, and the areas he touched upon were, Rural Credit, Good Roads, Equal Suffrage and Co-operation. Co-operation between Granges in the area of commercial buying and selling as well as simply meeting together to discuss the problems of farmers and exchange ideas, he went on to say we should Co-Operate with the Agricultural College in determining what crops are adapted to the particular locality and endeavor to specialize in those crops. He ends that passage with the words "Co-operation adds strength to organization. We should not neglect our opportunities." His take on the road building seems fitting even today. 100 years ago money was being spent on building high priced boulevards for tourists and pleasure seekers and roads needed in the farming communities were at the mercy of paving trusts. Of course now days the tourist industry is a 10.3 billion dollar industry, but still in terms of basic infrastructure let's not lose sight of what the farming community really means to each and every one of us. I was especially caught up in his writings on equal suffrage, and struck by the similarity of our world today as citizen's deal with the emotional issues of gay rights. How many other organizations have such a claim on history? Grangers have watched the rebuilding of these United States following the civil war, we have seen America embrace women's rights, something we as Grangers already recognized, we have been volunteering our time and talents long before President George H.W. Bush talked of his thousand points of light. And in our family membership we welcome any couple and their children to our Grange family.

Master's Good of the Order Address

Introduction

The information contained in this Good of the Order Address is, as stated Information for the "Good of the Order" and as such belongs to our membership. Please share this report with your members when you return back home. Use it, discuss it and act accordingly. We as members must always scrutinize our actions for the benefit of the order.

Membership

Membership seems to be our greatest self-described challenge. But is our response to this problem one that is in line with the gravity of the situation? What steps are being taken to encourage growth and to retain membership? Just having your membership chairman report at each meeting is a start, but probably just the first rung on the ladder to success. By all accounts the very best way to membership growth is to ask someone to join. Sounds simple doesn't it? But when did you last ask someone to join? I don't mean, did you have a brochure out that said "Join our Grange", I mean did you actually look someone in the eye and say, "We would love to have you as a member. Would you consider joining our Grange?"

I challenge each and every one of you to ask someone to join your Grange before the end of the summer. Last year I asked that each Grange make membership gain a priority. I encouraged everyone to actively work on it at every meeting, not just leave it to chance. And I can say that while we still had a loss last year, it was only 121 members. When you view this against the fact that we lost 145 due to death it shows, we are not losing members "out the back door." They are joining and staying a part of the organization.

No matter how we lose the member though, it still adds up to a lower membership, which means to the Community Grange fewer members to take part in community service, fewer members to help with the duties associated with the care of your hall, and fewer members with new ideas to grow your Grange. On a state level of course it means less money to balance the budget, fewer members to draw from to promote our organization, less clout at the legislature, and we start inviting conversations about our "relevance." I had hoped that we had hit the bottom of the cycle and started back up, but from 1st quarter reports we have dropped 160 members. So like any good farmer, we have to examine our efforts, to look at what we have done to grow our membership and seek improvements. That brings me back to my original question, "Did you ask someone to join?" The tending, watering, weeding will all be for nothing if you did not have seed planted to begin with.

Subordinate Granges

This past year we have reorganized two Subordinate Granges, Lexington and Bandon. In both cases the community came to the Grange and expressed an interest in joining our family. Lexington was reorganized with 24 members present and Bandon with 14. In two very different areas of the State, both groups had seen something in the Grange that they believed in. While organizing, or reorganizing a Grange is seen as a great accomplishment, the real work begins after the Grange has started. We must make sure that these Granges are given the

support they need to become a knowledgeable and working part of our organization. We cannot expect a new Grange to grow and thrive if we simply hand them a paper charter and wish them well. We must be there to answer questions, to offer encouragement and to see that they grow to be a strong and purposeful part of their community. I would like to thank Derrell and Clarann Witty, as well as Roger and Gail Wilson for their help with Lexington, and Phyllis Wilson for her continued support of the Bandon Grange. With the help of these dedicated members our newest Granges have had the chance to grow into their role in the community and have been schooled in what it means to belong to America's Family Fraternity.

I have had the pleasure of visiting a number of Granges this past year. My visits with the training sessions were very worthwhile, as were those with our Membership tour. Many of our members were eager to show off their Grange and all that they are doing for their members and the community. One memorable incident occurred at Ada Grange during the membership tour. When the members were tasked with coming up with a short speech about their Grange, they included wording to the effect that they "have fun together" and "are family." I know of no greater accolade for a Grange than saying you are family and you like each other. It is not so in all of our Granges. To be a family doesn't necessarily mean you will always get along, or that everyone will always agree, but it should mean that at the end of the day we treat each other with respect. I have visited Granges where this is not true.

There is very little as frustrating for anyone associated with the Grange than seeing a membership come apart because of internal struggles. While most of my visits to Granges have been both pleasant and productive, there have been a few that have been downright unpleasant and where I have seen members fighting among themselves over things that happened in the distant past or worse yet, didn't happen at all, just in someone's imagination. I have seen bullying, screaming, name calling, and other disappointing behaviors. If we are to grow and thrive as a membership, all of us must recognize and stop these behaviors when they occur.

Pomona Granges

Our Pomona Granges should be there to help our Subordinate or Community Granges, but in too many cases these Pomona Granges are barely functioning. Revitalizing and building our Pomona Granges has to become a priority for the Oregon State Grange. This year we tried to revitalize Multnomah Pomona, and Sister Cat Thomas put many hours into visitations at each Grange in Multnomah County, but it did not happen. For this to fail tells me that our members do not see the worth in the Pomona Grange, but there was a time when Pomona Granges brought value to their membership. By the combined efforts of all the Granges in a district the Pomona Grange had a positive influence on local issues. They were a meeting place for all members to exchange ideas and to network. They were a clearing ground for new ideas, and a positive role model for the Community Granges in the area. We need to put the time and effort required into strengthening and rebuilding our Pomona Granges before it is too late. I recommend that a task force be appointed to work with the State Master to develop a plan to help the existing Pomona Granges rebuild and to work on bringing back Pomona Granges to those areas of the State where they have been lost.

Junior Grange Program

I am very pleased to report that through the Junior 1+ program we now have 38 official Junior members of 21 Subordinate Granges in the State of Oregon. Our Junior Director has

formulated a great guide for the 1+ members, as well as a separate guide for the leaders in each Grange. I see this program as being the beginning of a new chapter in the Grange, and I think that it is a well-timed answer to some of our challenges to recruiting young families. This program gives the family a place to come together where the parents can take part in the Subordinate Grange but the children also have a program of their own.

In addition we also have three areas around the State, Washington-Yamhill Pomona, Benton Pomona and Lane Pomona, who are working to start a Junior Grange in which the children elect their own officers and determine their own activities. Having a chartered Junior Grange with 13 or more members is still a wonderful ideal to strive for, but do not cast aside the 1+ program. It can and will benefit your Grange.

Conferences

This last winter and spring I made my way around the state to conduct Master's training sessions in 13 different areas. I was extremely happy with the ultimate turnout. Over half of our Subordinate and Pomona Granges were represented at the conferences. Another bright spot was that our attendees included many new Masters who had not been present at previous conferences. Evaluations showed that members were happy with the day of concentrated training and are looking forward to the same treatment being applied to other offices. Currently there is a definite commitment to sessions involving the Secretary and Treasurer. There is no doubt that we need to continue on with these sessions. We have allowed our intuitional knowledge to fall so low that many of the Masters who attended the training were unaware of some of the most basic parts of running a Grange meeting. The Master's charge in the installation calls on the new Master to "set the example in all things," and I believe the ones who attended these training sessions were striving to do just that.

While I concentrated my efforts on training for a specific office, several of the Directors got together at the retreat we had in October and planned a series of combined conferences. The Membership Committee, Community Service, GWA, Lecturers and the Communication team were represented at six conferences, one in each district. I was able to attend one and was most impressed with the full agenda of information. I also heard many good things later as I traveled around the State. People were very happy with the combination of the various committees. I hope to expand on this example next year and include all the State Committees in a series of conferences, providing members with a one stop resource that controls the time investment to be made by our members.

Finances

As predicted the National Grange did indeed raise their dues by the \$2.00 as discussed at our last session. In preparation for this we adopted our own dues raise last June that went into effect in January. Because of this foresight we are able to continue the programs and promotions of the past several years. While the State Grange budget reflects that we basically can take care of all of our office and fraternal needs, it does not look as though we have room for much else. And as far as budgeted income is concerned that is correct. But if you take the time to look through our financial statement you will find that we do have some money that has, through delegate action, been set aside for other purposes. We have a building maintenance fund that we have drawn on occasionally for large ticket items, like the upgrade to the heating and cooling system, and the new roof that was put on several years back. We also have a Leadership/Membership fund that has been in place since we started taking part in the supportive membership program through GIA. Around \$24,000 per year

accrues to this account, and it has been the source of funding for special projects over the years. Currently we have used some of this money to pay for brochures that are available to each Grange at no-cost, and you will see that about \$8,000 from this account has been added to the budget to cover the Marketing and Public Events, such as the Log Cabin at the State Fair, Ag Fest, the FFA convention and various other events where the State Grange is present to promote the Grange. As you may remember from last year the money from dormant Granges that have not reorganized in the 7-year period prescribed by the National Grange reverts to a fund that is now being used for the Grant program as well as officer training. Finally we have the Emergency fund that has over \$123,000 as of the end of 2014. Per delegate action last year one dollar per member will start going into the emergency fund as of the first of this year as a hedge against future dues increases. With the dues raise last year we have been able to let these funds continue to grow to meet our future needs. One Increase that has been made this year with the increase in the budget is to fund our Directors to a slightly higher level, knowing that they are getting out into the State with their programs and ideas. As you know the State Grange leases out a small portion of the Salem office to an accounting firm. That lease expired in 2009, and has been working as a monthly rental since then, we are now in the process of signing a new lease with a slight increase to start in 2016. I urge every Subordinate Grange to take a look at your own rental rates each year and make sure you are receiving a fair price for the use of our halls. Make sure that you look at your hard costs, such as electricity, insurance, heat, water and sewer before deciding if your rate is appropriate.

The discussion of the State Grange finances now includes a discussion of the Grant program. Last year we received 25 grant requests, and ended up funding 12. We had set ten as our goal, but even with the ten we were still well under the \$50,000 cap and so funded two more. For the most part the program is progressing quite well. As of this date one Grange is completely finished with their project, and the others are still working through their project schedules. I am very pleased to say that this program is continuing on with another \$50,000 available this year. Most of the Grant criteria have stayed the same, but let me emphasize that the grants are for hall appearance and hall functionality. So many, many projects will certainly be considered for one of these grants. I would say the best course of action is to submit a request, no matter what your project is and allow the Grant Committee to make the decision.

Officers

Each Grange officer performs an important function within and outside of our Grange meetings. I cannot emphasize enough that we all need to realize this and to take pride and responsibility for our actions as officers and members of the organization. It takes all officers doing their job to make a good Grange meeting. Upon being elected to an office each member must take or renew their oath of office and if each of us takes to heart the installation charge, we would fulfill our obligation by learning that job, by attending the meetings and by taking pride in all that we do as we represent our Grange. If we do these things we will be well on our way to making our Grange an effective and worthwhile organization.

State Session

Next year we will be meeting in District #1, probably at Talent Middle School. As I recommended last year we will be starting the week on Saturday, instead of Sunday. All six degrees will be presented on the weekend, as well as the talent contest, the memorial service, the kick-off banquet and the ceremonial opening of the Oregon State Grange. Not everything is finalized yet, but as you can see there will be some big changes. I have been

attending the Oregon State Grange convention since 1969 and in all that time the 6th degree has always been on Wednesday night. So for nearly one half century we have done it "that way." Now we are going to try it another way and perhaps another way after that. But what we must all remember is that there is no wrong way if we are all committed to working with each other. If we all embrace some new ideas, and work to see that all goes smoothly; we will have a great session. We may find that the new way is better or we may decide that we were happy with the old way, but keep an open mind and work together for the good of the organization and whatever way we choose will become the right way.

Social Media

We seem to live in a very open and transparent world, sometimes probably too transparent. We must all remember that what we post on social media is seen by nearly everyone, young and old alike, and remember that although some of these posts are on personal pages they are still seen by our members. Before you post something that will end up on our Grange pages, think about whether you would engage in that same conversation to everyone's face. Would you still make the same comment if you were saying it to the new member who just joined at age 14, whom you barely know, or to the elderly member who has known you since you were the new member joining right out of the Junior Grange?

In Memoriam

Yesterday we assembled to pay our respects and tributes to our members who have gone before us to their reward. Each year we honor those who have served beside us as officers and delegates at our State session, but what better tribute can we give to these individuals than to always remember and honor the impact they made upon our lives. What is more fitting than continuing to dedicate ourselves to the fraternity that they served, and what is more honorable than to live our lives with the faith that sustained them.

Let us also remember and honor those individuals in the armed forces who have served and are currently serving our country. They too deserve our upmost respect and admiration.

Conclusion

In reflecting over the last year I have visualized the Oregon State Grange as a garden. A carefully tended garden is a beautiful work of art that is pleasing to the eye as well as to the taste. But, as stated in the installation charge for the Master "if neglect is allowed, the moral weed crop will baffle and torment you." So let us not lose sight of that which makes our garden a true work of art, let us maintain our fraternal ties to each other and to the organization. As we work together this week for the benefit of the Grange we will again set our course for the future. I take this labor very seriously and hope that you do as well. So let us tend the garden of the Grange together, making sure that we plant the very best in seed and that we are zealous in our efforts so that we may harvest a bountiful and beautiful crop and that we may partake of our labors as friends and family.

Overseer's Report

We've all just wrapped up a busy Grange year with our many contests culminating here at this session. Is this where we as Grangers start planning activities for another year? Is January or December the beginning of our Grange year when new officers take their chairs and when we turn our minds to marking our calendar with new activities? Thank you for allowing me to serve another year as your Chaplain. Sadly, it's another year of sending far more sympathy cards than get-well cards. As our members grow older, it becomes an increasingly sad statistic.

I try to send cards on a regular basis to those members who I know have a chronic or terminal illness. I think it's important to let them know that their brothers and sisters in the Grange have not forgotten them and encourage you to do so also, especially if they are a member of your Grange.

Many times I get notified by secretaries or the State office about an illness or a death. Remember unless they are in the Roster I have no address to send a card and in the case of a death, I need an address of the next of kin or closest relative to send condolences. Forwarding an obituary often does not give me the information I need. I would estimate I send between 100 and 150 cards a year so the more information you can help me with the better.

This year a member who has been in the hospital since January has been regularly communicating with me. To my knowledge, he has no family and the Grange is his family. I am concerned with the care he is getting and John and I will be traveling to Portland to check on him. If any of you live in the Portland area and would care to check in on him in the future, please talk to me privately at State Grange.

I ask all of you to remember the lessons of the first four degrees:

Faith: "A higher confidence in a Supreme Being. We are constantly passing blindly along the pathway of life, events occurring that we do not understand, and often encountering difficulties and obstructions in our way but we should press forward, having Faith that God will ultimately bring us into the broad and pleasant fields of Paradise."

Love: "If thine enemy hungry, feed him. Do good, hoping for nothing in return, and your reward shall be great. Love one another."

Hope: "Changes and transformations are constantly passing before us – the dying grain into the living stalk, the tiny seeds into majestic trees, we have but another lesson taught us of the wondrous works of God. Changes and transformations are constantly passing before us- the dying grain into the living stalk, the tiny seeds into majestic trees, the bud to blossom and the blossom to fruit. All these preach eloquently of the wonderworking God; and if the beauties of this world, when rightly viewed, offer so much of the magnificence of the Creator to charm us here, what must be the sublime grandeur of that Paradise above, not made with hands, eternal in the heavens?"

Charity: We must reap for the mind as well as for the body, and from the abundance of our harvest, in good deeds and kind words, dispense Charity. "……" And forget not Charity. Agriculture Committee Report

The past year has been a year of learning for me as the Agriculture Committee Director. This has been my first experience serving the Oregon State Grange; outside my own home Grange of Marys River #685, in Philomath.

Selecting district chairs was the first challenge, and I was pleased to have Jason Couch in District 1, Randi Embree in District 2, Ed Thurston in District 3, Jess Holler in District 5, June Colony in District 6, and Vernon and Paula Herrick as at-large members of the committee. Unfortunately Ed Thurston had to step down in March due to health issues. This has left me with District 3 and 4 with empty chairs, which I would like to fill.

Agriculture Committee chairs visited several Granges on the behalf of the State Grange, encouraging Subordinates to send their delegates to the State Session. Our visits were warmly received, and we enjoyed interacting with the various halls.

In February I attended the OSU Small Farms Conference. Over 900 people attended this event with an average age in the 30s and about 40 percent women. I attended to research the event and plan how to best represent the Oregon Grange at the 2016 version of this event. The people that attend this conference are excellent potential Grange members, and I hope to talk to many of them at a Grange booth at next year's conference.

In March the Agriculture Committee, and other OSG committees, had representatives greeting FFA members at the FFA state convention. We had hundreds of FFA members visit the booth and sign up for chances at Wilco Gift Cards. The Oregon State Grange booth was beautiful, with many large photos and a great deal of information. Our State Grange has sponsored the Oregon FFA Prepared Public Speaking Event for 79 years. This year it was my pleasure to present the award banners to the finalists, including first place winner, Shea Booster, who will speak at our State Session on Thursday.

In April the Agriculture Committee and many Grange volunteers helped thousands of visitors to the Oregon Ag Fest plant seedlings to take home. Over 18,000 people visited this event, and a good portion of them walked through the Grange booth. Herrick Farms grew the seedlings, and Teufel Products Company donated the potting soil for this effort. This single event provides the Oregon State Grange the opportunity to make a good impression on many of the young families that attend this celebration of Agriculture in Oregon.

This year at the State Session the Agriculture Committee organized the Ag tour which visited the Columbia Basin Agricultural Research Center to see some of their long running experiments. We then visited the Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla Indian Reservation Native Plant Nursery where we heard about the First Foods Program and about the Tribe's Fisheries Program.

Also at State Session we will have two conferences: one on the Status of Wolves in Oregon, and a second conference on the New Young Farmers. These topics are of interest to many of our Grange members and will likely promote thoughtful conversations.

The Agriculturalist of the Year contest brought three strong applications from John Fine of Riversdale #731, Donald Guttridge of Springwater #263, and Jef Jalof of Lowell #745. After considering their applications the independent judges chose John Fine to honor in 2015 as our

Agriculturalist of the Year. John has been involved in agriculture all of his life, as a farmer, as an agricultural educator, as an appointed member of a commodity commission, and as a Granger. In all of these aspects he has constantly worked to improve, and he has been willing to step forward and take on responsibility. John is very deserving of this award, and it is an honor to present it to him.

In the coming year I hope to use this years' experience to guide the Agriculture Committee more effectively, contacting more Granges and more potential members. The future is bright.

Communications Team Report

Grange Bulletin

Several adjustments were made to the Bulletin this year. Two of the issues now contain four color pages (back, front and middle section). These appeared in the August/September issue with pictures from state convention and in the February/March issue, which was the one provided to Granges who asked for copies to use for Grange Month events.

At the request of some members, starting with the December/January issue, the mailing label was moved to the front page. Now when the paper is folded the masthead/front page is facing up. This not only improves how it looks when displayed, but also gained a few column inches for type on the back page.

Additional efforts were in reformatting and making it more appealing. We had received numerous compliments on our enhanced Bulletin.

A goal was set for the 2014-15 year to have stories/notices from at least 100 different Granges appear in the paper. Ninety Subordinate/Community and nine Pomona Granges have submitted stories in the past year. Additionally, eight Junior Granges or Subordinates with 1+ Juniors provided stories on their Juniors for the paper. Next year we hope to have even more Granges represented in the paper. Wouldn't it be nice if every Grange in the state appeared at least once each year in the Bulletin?

Website

The Website is in maintenance mode. This means that the Webmaster adds events to the calendar, changes meeting days and time and rentals contacts, updates addresses and phone numbers, and adds or fixes forms. In 2010 she estimated that she spent ten minutes per day doing web work. Now that time has doubled, not necessarily because there is more of it, but because there are multiples pages to update.

At least nine-five percent of the State Grange forms are on the website. Still members contact the State Master to suggest putting a form on the website. She asked, "Don't you get tired of hearing that over and over?" After six years, the Webmaster is accustomed to it.

The biggest issue is getting forms in electronic format, so the Webmaster doesn't have to retype them. Another big issue is errors. An unhappy member once publically claimed that "The website is full of errors. It's 80% wrong." While the Webmaster makes her share of typos, in many cases the information provided was not proofed.

We are working closely with the State Grange office and the membership to improve the functionality and usefulness of the orgrange.org website. New forms and more contact information are continuously being added, and the Calendar of Events page has become very popular for promoting local, Pomona and State Grange activities/events.

Publications, Conferences

A new booklet was published this year that provides rules and deadlines for awards, contests, and scholarships sponsored by the Agriculture, Community Service, GWA, Juniors, Lecturer's, Membership, and Youth and Young Adult departments. The booklet was mailed to the Grange Bulletin mailing list. A color cover caught the attention of some members; others discarded it just like they did the Activity Planning Guide.

The State Grange Executive Committee has approved printing this booklet annually. The plan is to mail to members and non-members who participated this year and to send multiple copies to Granges. If Directors meet our December 1 deadline, next year's booklet will be distributed earlier.

This year we tried a few new tactics to promote State Grange activities. Postcards were sent to Masters and Overseers advertising the State Master's training conferences that were held throughout Oregon this year, generating increased participation and favorable comments about the reminder. Over 90 Granges were represented at these conferences, many of which had not recently attended a State Grange activity.

Press releases were sent out this year to many local newspapers to inform the general public about Grange activities, events and recognitions. These included announcements about scholarship winners, community recognition events, the OSG Volunteer of the Year and our Oregon participants in the National Grange Convention. A significant number of our press releases were known to have been reprinted in those papers.

Conclusion

We were happy to help a number of Granges with setting up Facebook pages, writing press releases, publishing articles in the Grange Bulletin, and creating fliers for events. Please remember that this committee is here to help you with ideas to promote your Grange and improve communications within your membership and your community. We hope you attend our exciting and thrilling conference on Wednesday of this State Session to learn even more about marketing and promoting your Grange, You will take away lots of ideas, tip sheets, and maybe a 'hundred grand'!!

Serving as your Community Service-Involvement Director this past year, I have realized that **Serving Others** gives me great pleasure. To my wonder, I fit this picture very well. I am a full-time volunteer in my community, and I am excited to help promote our Community Service projects and the benefits of serving others. Thank you, Worthy Master for choosing me as your Community Service Director.

Our District conferences enlightened me on what an outstanding organization we have. Many of you are doing a great job in your communities. And I am amazed with how many different projects we are doing across the state. I have developed a booklet of your ideas to share with your fellow Grangers. Yes, these ides came from you – from talking with you are conferences and from the reports. Yes, I read all the reports! The only down fall we have is telling our story and spreading the word. Don't forget that our Grange Bulletin loves to hear what you are doing. And it is FREE press.

As you know I have made a few changes to Oregon's program to bring it into line with the National Grange guidelines. Oregon State Grange receives prize money (\$250) from the National Grange, IF 25% of Granges send in their Community Service report. **Yes, we made it!** By April 1, we exceeded our goal of 25%. But, I must tell you that my goal was much higher. I wanted to see if we could make 50% of Granges sending reports. I extended the report deadline from March 31 to the first day of the State Grange convention, June 29th by noon. We had 38% of Granges report! **Good job Grangers!**

The <u>Annual Community Service Report</u> is very important. All participating Granges will receive a recognition certificate for their Annual Report and Yearbook. The first place winner of the <u>Community Service Yearbook</u> will be sent to National Grange. The book should include pictures, documentation and/or news articles showing your Grange projects for the past year. Your interaction in your community will let people know that "you are the Grange." If you did not do a Yearbook this year, I encourage you to visit the Community Service area and this will encourage you to do a Yearbook next year.

The <u>Volunteer of the Year</u> program needs to be stepped up. I had five volunteer forms sent to me. On Tuesday evening I presented the award to Dennis Chapman of London Grange, who is very deserving. But I know we have a lot more than five outstanding volunteers in our Granges. So, look around for next year's Volunteer of the Year.

National Grange introduced a NEW program, the "Dick Patten Community Service Person of the Year Award," to recognize a Law Enforcement Officer (LEO) and Firefighter (FF) of the year. We all know that these public servants do an outstanding job of protecting our community. Your Grange may have recognized one of these individuals at several of your events this past year. Application forms have been sent to your Grange and can also be found on the State Grange website or in the Community Service room at State Session. Send me your nomination by August 1, 2015. The <u>Annual Food Bank Drive</u> has changed. Rather than transporting items to the State Grange Convention, your Grange should donate money, time or food to your local food bank and log the donations on the Annual Community Service Report as one of your projects. I am stepping up this program. We need to help "Feed the Hungry." At the State Session I will have ideas to help you promote this program in your Grange and community. Our Mission will be to alleviate hunger by supporting our local Food Bank. We can't meet the needs of the World by ourselves but one at a time we can help those in our community. Most Food Banks distribute thousands of pounds of food each year. By working together we can help our neighbors in need. Education Committee Report

Greetings Grange Brothers and Sisters,

Over the last year there have been some major changes in education in Oregon. The three large universities have set up their own institutional governing boards. The smaller universities have started planning for their own boards, which go into effect June 30.

It appears that the Oregon Education Investment Board will be eliminated, but the staff, including the current Chief Education Officer, will be retained for four more years. Their focus will be on smoothing students' entry into kindergarten, getting more students to graduate high school with the skills they need for college, and improving students' transition into post-secondary education.

One of the other changes in the works is to eliminate Fifth-Year Programs. These help students transition to college with a higher rate of success, especially among those who are the first in their family to go to college. I fully support keeping the programs and making it work statewide. However, if all K-12 districts were to implement the programs in their current configuration, the effect financially on the state of Oregon would be devastating.

Like it or not, Common Core testing in now in place.

Changes are also coming this next year. The big one for K12 is full-day kindergarten, which starts in September. It is not required, but those who don't implement full-day kindergarten will see a smaller share of the money.

Legislative Committee Report

It has been a pleasure to service as the Legislative Director of the Oregon State Grange. The year started off with a retreat for all Directors to plan for the upcoming year. At the retreat lots of issues came up and suggestions were made that created the events of the upcoming year ahead. Conferences were scheduled and the legislative department missed out on the conference due to my oversight. However, the Legislative Department plans to be part of the conference schedule in the coming year.

We had a very exciting time this year at Legislative Day on April 22nd at the State Capitol. We had 30 plus members and guests, who had the opportunity to speak with four legislators and two special interest groups about the issues affecting the Grange and its members. Thank you to Lobbyist, Jim Welch for helping make this day successful.

Thank you to our Worthy Master, Susan Noah, and my Legislative Committee for all their encouragement and hard work to make the committee a success.

Lobbyist's Report

The Legislative Committee Report includes some of the highlight information from the 2015 Oregon Legislative Session in Salem. For a fraternal organization such as the Oregon State Grange with diverse interests and concerns for state and national government it is necessary to indicate how challenging and partisan some of the issues are and how, seemingly easy, some other issues are in comparison.

In Oregon alone it has been very challenging for the agriculture industries, and property owners overall, to address some of the environmental and animal rights organizations legislative agendas. Furthermore, in the past several years the legislation on large employers described as the corporate monster and evil corporations has increased in 2015 immensely. This has spilled over on small businesses in Oregon due to the fact that many are perceived as big corporations when in fact they are just very successful family owned corporations with a seemingly large foot print.

The number of bills in the 2015 Legislative Session with the distinct purpose of providing more benefits for employees at the expense of employers, especially small employers, increased drastically. There is nothing wrong with increased benefits for employees if, and only if, the employer/owner of the business is providing them at their discretion and not at the mandate of the Legislature.

Here are some of the employee vs. employer legislation passed so far. Mandatory Paid Sick Leave (SB 454-A) passed the Senate 17-13 and passed the House 33-24. The Mandatory State-Run Retirement Savings bill (HB 2960-A) passed the House and the Senate along partisan lines. House Bill 3025 would prohibit employers from compelling job applicants from disclosing their criminal history prior to an initial interview, passed the Senate 21-8. House Bill 2764 would increase workers' compensation costs by 5 percent as a result of the dramatically increased attorney fees authorized by the bill; however, the Senate passed a negotiated version of the bill that would scale back the cost increases significantly. Now with two weeks left of the Session the Speaker is proposing an increase in the minimum wage to \$11 in 2016, \$12 in 2017 and \$13 in 2018. In addition, her proposal will allow local governments to raise their own minimum wage to higher levels (HB 2012-2 the proposal to raise the statewide minimum wage to \$13 an hour by 2018 had a public hearing on June 17th).

On the other hand, it has been almost effortless to provide needed legislation for our returning veterans. Programs and support services have been passed in the House and Senate with splendid bi-partisan votes. The only challenge has been providing the funding at the level that is sometimes needed or desired.

Furthermore, in the good bill leger, the House passed House Bill 3400, a bill that was the result of the statewide passage of Measure 91, on a 52-4 vote. This bill allows counties and cities who voted against the legalization of marijuana to prohibit its use in their jurisdictions. It also greatly increases the parameters for growing medical marijuana. And, an agreement has been struck

on SB 129; the bill that would preserve the state's Gain Share program. The Gain Share program is important to provide incentives for local government to use its property tax tools to incent job creation. The Gain Share program gives counties a share of the income tax revenue generated by new jobs under the state's Strategic Investment Program. It could be a significant positive development as the bill will provide significant funding for rural economic development as well as Career and Technical Education.

However, it is important to mention tax and fee increases. The Legislature passed the Oregon Fish & Wildlife Budget bill, with fee increases for hunters and fishermen, out of Ways & Means Committee to the House and Senate where it is expected to pass. Also, on a party-line vote the House Committee on Revenue passed a comprehensive tax increase bill, SB 925-A, out of committee and to the floor for a vote later this week. House Republicans raised a number of concerns related to the constitutionality of the proposal, which includes nearly \$180 million in new taxes on employers and middle-class Oregonians. Republicans insisted a three-fifths majority vote in the House will be needed to pass the revenue-raising bill, and warned the bill will be subject to legal challenge in the Oregon Supreme Court if it passes.

On June 24th the special Senate Committee on Transportation Funding issued their draft legislation for comment. The proposal changes the previously passed Low Carbon Fuel Standard (LCSF) SB 324,to an "on ramp" approach instead of the "off ramp" approach, providing for increased ethanol and bio-diesel blending only if there is product readily available and car and truck technology advances with the increased blending. However, the increased fees and fuel tax, and negotiable transportation improvement projects and the mitigated LCFS may sideline this proposal for another Legislative Session.

Some Budget bills that are being voted on this week:

HB 5002 A for the Department of Agriculture (DOA); SB 5502 A for the Department of Administrative Services (DAS); SB 5504 A for the Department of Corrections (DOC); SB 5540 A for the Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board (OWEB); HB 2411B relating to the Teacher Standards and Practices Commission; SB 5510 for the Department of Energy; SB 5512 for the Department of Geology and Mineral Industries; SB 5534 for the Department of Public Safety

As you can see, with passage of some of the budget bills the 2015 Legislative Session is drawing closer to Sine Die. Many of us are more than ready for that to occur.

Executive Committee Meeting - June 1, 2014

The meeting was called to order at 9 a.m. on the above date by Master Susan Noah with Overseer Celia Luttrell, Secretary Phyllis Wilson and Executive Committee members Roger Wilson, Malcolm Trupp and Don Sether in attendance. A quorum was declared. Also attending was Don Kingsborough, member of Warner Grange #117. The opening prayer was led by the Secretary.

MINUTES:

Don moved, Malcolm 2nd to approve the minutes of the April 12, 2014 minutes as corrected. Motion carried.

FINANCIAL REPORTS:

<u>Current Reports</u> – The books have been closed for 2013. Financial reports for the period ending February 28, 2014 were distributed along with the various Fund Balance Reports and Interest Distribution recap. There was some discussion on the amounts of scholarship awards.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS:

<u>Notice of Restriction on Title</u> – Suzy Ramm has more completed and these are being reviewed by our attorney. Trips to court houses might be required.

<u>Willows Property</u> – Sale of the property to Morrow County Grain Growers Inc. for \$55,000 was finalized May 19th. Proceeds to OSG were \$51,841.77.

<u>Matching Grant Program</u> – The Master has four members for the grant selection committee and is looking for a fifth member, hopefully someone with contracting experience. Don Kingsborough, a committee member, was with us today to help with discussions on criteria, trust factors, possible problems. Reasonable expenses for committee members were also considered.

<u>Bandon Reorganization</u> – Attempts have been made two times and will be made again on July 15th. Applicants are not realizing that there has to be 13 in attendance at the same time to reorganize. Phyllis, along with other volunteers, will have a booth at the July 4th celebration.

NEW BUSINESS:

<u>Temporary Staff Member</u> – Steve Kroeker is back in the office for a while and will be helping with State Session paperwork and updating dormant property.

<u>Use of Lane Pomona Trailer</u> – Don moved, Roger 2nd to pay \$350 for the use of the trailer to be used for hauling necessary items to Redmond for State Session. Motion carried.

<u>Investment Proposal from Moss-Adams Wealth Advisors</u> – The presentation was made by Scott Barker, who began with a review of our Investment Policy by comparing it with some of our current asset allocations. Recommendations were offered on moving from current investment firms to other firms. Costs, fees, etc. were considered. Malcolm moved, Roger 2nd to accept the Moss Adams proposal and move invested funds accordingly. Motion carried.

<u>Warner Grange Request to Increase Loan Amount</u> – In a letter, dated May 31st, this Grange asked to increase its current loan amount by \$10,000 because of unexpected repair expenses caused by a water leak in a sink on the third floor that flooded the basement. The rental income during its busiest season was lost causing the Grange to use funds from its checking and savings accounts to pay monthly expenses. Malcolm moved to increase the current \$30,000 loan by \$10,000 for a total loan amount of \$40,000 with the same terms of the original loan. Phyllis 2nd. Motion carried.

<u>Spence Scholarship</u> – Three applications were received and scored. Christopher S. Loughridge of Clarkes Grange, a 4-year-member, was chosen for the \$500 award.

The recommendations for changes to the Natural Resources section of our Legislative Handbook were assigned to Environment & Ecology Committee. The recommendations for the Ag Handbook will be considered by the State Session Ag Committee.

<u>2015 Proposed Budget</u> – The budget was presented with two (2) options – one without a dues increase and one with a dues increase. Discussion included formation of a "Program Development Team" to focus on statewide program development beginning with our junior and youth programs. Don moved, Roger seconded to present both options of the proposed budget to the State Session delegates. Motion carried. The State Treasurer Sarah Kingsborough will make the presentation.

<u>State Session</u> – The schedule was distributed. We were reminded that the 2nd delegate must be elected. This might cause some problems, so the Master will be lenient if a second delegate shows up without proper credentials. Dates were set for loading the trailer.

<u>Declaration of Purpose Brochure</u> – National Grange does not have these brochures available at this time. The Ink Spot, a local printer, presented prices and Celia will check with her daughter for other prices. Phyllis moved and Don 2nd that, as last recourse, we order 1,000 from The Ink Spot at a cost of \$473.30 in order to have them available for State Session. Motion carried.

<u>Projector for State Session</u> – Two estimates for rental of a projector, screen, stand and cable were received from Audio Visions Plus Inc. in Salem. Malcolm moved, Don seconded to approve the proposal costing \$595 that includes a 9'x12' screen, stand, cable and Sanyo projector. The vote was 5-1 with Roger casting the dissenting vote. Motion carried.

Lexington Grange, Morrow County – Possible reorganization. State Deputy Derrell Witty and Susan have talked to an interested woman. Susan, along with the Wittys and Marilyn Reiher, will meet this Tuesday with some community members to discuss reorganization. The hall is in good shape. John Knox and Derrell agreed to be mentors for one year.

<u>NE Portland – Possible Grange</u> – About 15 urban farmers had contacted National Grange Membership Director Michael Martin about starting a Grange in Portland as an urban farming group much like our work with the Extension Service in the past. Bob and Sandi Ludi and Susan met with them on May 14th. Group had heard of green Grangers and asked for names of people with "like minds". They would like National Grange to be their sponsor as an urban farming group much like our work with the Extension Service in the past and asked that OSG explore this idea.

<u>GMIC Corporation Fee</u> – The general consensus was to let this lapse.

DECISIONS MADE BY -MAIL:

We received copies of information from the Center for Nonprofit Stewardship regarding voting by email. ORS 65.341 provides that a board can take an action without having a board meeting so long as the decision is unanimous among all board members, as reflected by their signed, written consent to the action.

Phyllis moved, Malcolm 2nd to ratify the actions made by email since our last meeting. Motion carried. The decisions included:

Sandlake Grange - \$5,000 from Trust Funds

Woodburn Grange - \$3,000 being paid by ODOT to Grange. When funds are received, they will be donated to charity and not submitted to OSG.

Riversdale Grange - \$2,870 from Trust Funds

MASTER'S REPORT:

<u>Crow</u> – New promissory note sent, signed and returned. First payment on new schedule is this month.

<u>Elk City</u> – Decision made regarding Mr. Borre's purchase of property was sent to him – no response yet from him.

Elmira – No communications from them recently.

<u>Goshen</u> – Neighbor's attorney met with our attorney and Susan to review Goshen's financial records. Discussions continue on the retaining wall.

Lookingglass – Was unable to attend May meeting, will try for June.

<u>Mohawk</u> - Members doing different fundraisers including collecting and selling the bat guano from its attic. A \$1,000 scholarship will be presented this year to a Mohawk High School senior. North Fork Property – Still listed at \$80,000. Received verbal offer of \$40,000 from someone.

Same person then offered \$34,000 to real estate agent. Listing agreement now signed through end of this year. Don moved, Malcolm seconded to have a title search done on this property at our expense. Motion carried. Any offer is to be made in writing.

<u>Rickreall</u> – Changed meeting time to 1 p.m. Thursday.

<u>South Fork Property</u> –By-Law information given to Ben Boswell on how to proceed with their proposal to sell property.

<u>Willamette</u> – Attended May 13th meeting. No quorum. Some members of the Willamette Grange Assoc. arrived to let Grange know that there would be a meeting in June to elect new board members. After compliance with this group's by-laws, their members will vote on turning the Grange building over to Willamette Grange and dissolve the Assoc.

<u>Membership Tour</u> – Michael Martin's membership tours seemed to go well. 38 Granges represented with 125 individuals. Welcoming Ceremony performed at the one in Union County for 4 new members. Communication team is putting together a "box of promotional items" that Granges can purchase for displays.

<u>Ag-Fest</u> – 5,000 seedlings given away, probably touched 6,000-7,000 people. Membership group had 2 tables in addition to the planting area.

<u>Polk County Fair</u> – We will have a booth at this fair, which will be held the second weekend in August.

National Grange Quarterly GIA Payment – We received \$5,370 for the 2nd quarter, 2014.

<u>Mud Springs Property</u> – Met with some people about this property – however, probably not interested.

OFFICER/DEPUTY REPORTS:

<u>Malcolm Trupp</u> – Is seeing that the grass is kept cut at Franklin.

<u>Phyllis Wilson</u> – Attended Josephine Pomona meeting yesterday at Deer Creek Grange in Selma and Fairfield's meeting near Keizer last night. Pleasantly surprised at turnout, participation and order of business at both events. Josephine Granges will be participating in the county fair in August. Working to help with reorganization of Bandon Grange. Don Sether – Attended a recent Maplewood meeting.

A transfer of \$400,000 was made from checking into the Wells Fargo investment accounts. Funds will be moved from Wells Fargo, LPL and T Rowe Price by Moss Adams into Charles Schwab investments. Completion of the 2013 audit is being delayed by the former audit firm.

<u>Bandon Reorganization</u> – After two attempts, the reorganization hopefully will take place on Tuesday, July 15.

Lexington Reorganization – The reorganization was successful July 10th. The first meeting will be August 6th.

<u>Moss Adams Investments Update</u> – Scott Barker joined us and provided information on the consolidation of our investments into Charles Schwab and how to manage our investments. The discussion covered a "speculative" approach, historic and present approach, investment income into our annual budget, special Grange individual fund accounts and revising our current Investment Policy. Malcolm moved, Celia 2nd to proceed with changing our Investment Policy to allow a 50/50 split between equities and fixed income. Motion carried. Malcolm moved, Celia 2nd to approve the Moss Adams resolution to change the T Rowe Price

account to correct the signatures so that Susan can transfer money as necessary and to authorize the secretary to sign the resolution. Motion carried.

<u>Rockford Grange</u> – The fire department and the Grange signed the papers this past week for the building purchase and ground lease. Escrow and title search have to be completed. <u>GWA Donations</u> – Discussion centered on donations made for contest awards and scholarships and disbursement of such. This will all be resolved when a new GWA Director is appointed.

NEW BUSINESS:

<u>National Grange "Communications Fellows Grant"</u> – Suzy Ramm is applying for this grant, but the grant does not cover travel expenses. This would be an educational experience for her. Phyllis moved, Malcolm 2nd to allow airfare for two (2) people with funds to come from the Leadership/Membership Fund.

<u>Western Regional Van Rental to Montana</u> – Three (3) youth are going – possibly four (4). Charlotte Taylor and Ed Luttrell (the driver) will be traveling with the youth, so need a van to hold seven (7) people. Regionals will be held August 1st, 2nd and 3rd with those attending leaving on Thursday, July 31st. Jeanie Force and Sandi Ludi are also going. Malcolm moved, Celia 2nd to authorize OSG to rent a van to take people to Western Regionals in Missoula MT. Motion carried.

<u>Funding for Lexington</u> – This Grange consolidated with Willows and eventually Willows became dormant in 2010. OSG received \$48,000 from the recent sale of the Willows property. The Lexington building will need a new roof and the outside painted. Malcolm moved, Celia 2nd to take 50% of the consolidated Lexington/Willows dormant Grange fund balance as of June 30 and move into a trust for Lexington. Motion carried.

<u>Updating Data Base with National</u> – A considerable amount of information needs to be put into this and it needs to be done soon. We also need to update our policy handbook. Susan recommended that we hire Steve Kroeker to assume this work. Malcolm moved, Celia 2nd to allow OSG to hire Steve to update the National Grange database. Motion carried. <u>Youth Activities Fund</u> – Balance of this fund is only \$6,577. The sale of Goodie Basket tickets is decreasing and youth expenses at State Session increasing. Discussion only at today's meeting; no suggestions or decisions made.

- <u>Crow</u> The first quarterly loan payment was received on time.
- <u>Elmira</u> County Deputy Dennis Chapman has been working with them. Work party needed to help clean up the hall.

FINANCIAL REPORTS:

<u>Current Reports</u> – Reports are essentially completed through July. Celia has been concentrating on the investment account transfers.

<u>Membership Reports</u> – With figures compiled by staff member Jan Oleson, the reports covered various membership totals such as affiliate members and family plans, Granges with delinquent quarterly reports, loans & notes receivable and dormant Grange expenses. The report showed 176 Granges at the end of the 3rd Quarter and 19 Pomonas.

<u>Moss Adams Investments Update</u> – Scott Barker from Moss Adams Wealth Advisors joined us and provided information on the transfer of our assets into Charles Schwab. There was discussion on realized and unrealized gains and losses.

<u>Audit</u> – Moss Adams is almost finished with this audit.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS:

<u>Bandon Grange</u> – Reorganized July 15th with 15 people. Phyllis will mentor for one (1) year. <u>Lexington</u> - Reorganized July 10th with 22 people. Making improvements to building and parking lot. Clarann and Derrell Witty will mentor for one (1) year. <u>Rockford Grange</u> – The building now belongs to the Grange and there is a 99-year grounds lease. Attorney fees total \$8,573 with Rockford asking OSG to assume 50% of the total owing. Malcolm moved to pay up to 50% of the \$8,573 attorney fees through September 30, 2014. Don 2nd. Motion carried. Funds to come from legal fees in the operating budget.

NEW BUSINESS:

Idaho State Session - Susan will attend as the National Grange rep.

<u>Matching Grant Awards</u> – Ten Granges were chosen for grants with the committee recommending two (2) additional Grange applications be approved. \$50,000 had been set aside for grant funding, and adding but only \$32,000 will be needed for the ten. There were 25 applications submitted.

Malcolm moved to accept the committee's recommendation for the ten (10) Granges. Celia 2nd. Motion carried. Don moved to accept the two (2) additional applications, Malcolm 2nd. Motion carried.

<u>American Income Life</u> – A letter, dated June 16, 2014, had been received from Forest Grove Grange member Jami Duyck expressing concerns with the experiences they had with American Income Life. Susan has discussed these concerns with the company agent. <u>Sunnyridge Grange Sale Request</u> – In a letter received at the office on September 24th, members were requesting permission to sell the Grange property as they can no longer maintain the property and building. They have received a purchase offer of \$35,000. Susan sent them a letter explaining the procedures for selling Grange property and asked that someone from their Grange attend today's meeting. There was no response. Don offered to check out the property in about two (2) weeks.

<u>Bellview Grange</u> – Don moved to accept a request from its Trust Fund in the amount of \$3,189 to reimburse the Grange for work already completed. Malcolm 2nd. Motion carried. The work

included excavation work underneath the building for easy access to plumbing and maintenance to the HVAC system.

<u>Listing of Dormant Grange Properties</u> – Don moved, Malcolm 2nd to accept the recommendation of the Master to list Carver Mountain, Highland, Elk City, Mud Springs and Crowfoot with a real estate firm. Motion carried.

<u>Youth Co-Directors</u> – Scot and Clare Jacobson have been appointed to these positions. <u>Community Service Director</u> – Pat Heard has resigned.

<u>Phoenix Grange Request</u> – The Grange is requesting approval of a "Master Plan Construction Agreement" with the Phoenix Urban Renewal Agency. The Grange has applied for a grant to upgrade the exterior of its hall and the agreement is a requirement. Malcolm moved to approve the agreement between the Phoenix Urban Renewal Agency and Phoenix Grange. Don 2nd. Motion carried.

<u>Transfer of Money for Working Capital</u> - \$25,000 was transferred into the OSG checking account on September26th from an investment account.

<u>National Grange Appeal to Granges</u> – Granges have been sent letters from National Grange asking for donations to help with legal fees for trademark protection and challenges facing National Grange due to an ongoing situation with California State Grange. Don moved to donate \$3,000. Malcolm 2nd. Motion carried.

<u>By-Law Changes Regarding State Officer Voting</u> – Discussion centered on a resolution approved at State Session which would eliminate the primary preferential election of state officers. The Secretary mentioned that the definition of a family membership in our current bylaws is not the same as the definition in the National Digest. We use the words "husband and wife" whereas the Digest uses the word "couple". Susan will contact the National Master as to whether or not the Executive Committee can go ahead and make this change.

<u>2015 Calendar of Events</u> – The Communications Team is partnering with directors to compile an OSG 2015 calendar of events and presented a written proposal today for consideration. Don moved to accept the proposal to purchase 200 calendars with money to come from the Leadership/Membership Fund. Malcolm 2nd. Motion carried. Each Grange will receive a calendar and others will be available at \$5 each.

<u>Redesigning the Program & Activities Guide</u> – The current guide includes contests and programs. Directors want two (2) separate documents. The "program" document will be entitled "Get Involved" and would last more than one (1) year and could be used as a membership recruitment tool. The "contest" document would be reformatted and sent out the first year to every member and, possibly, a few to each Grange. Don moved to accept this proposal with the money to come from the Leadership/Membership Fund. Malcolm 2nd. Motion carried.

Jan's Office Computer – Don moved to have her computer upgraded as necessary. Malcolm 2nd. Motion carried.

<u>Request from OSG Flora</u> – Sister Cookie Trupp asked that OSG pay for the cost of the new gowns and then have the individual lady officers repay OSG. General consensus of the group was to allow this practice if needed.

<u>Purchase and Sale Agreement between Property Owned by Boring Damascus Grange and Metro</u> – It was emphasized that this is not the property on which the hall is located. Metro's Natural Area Programs has approached the Grange to purchase approximately three (3) acres of property at a price of \$185,000. Notice was given to members of a special meeting held this past October 3rd regarding this offer. Malcolm moved to approve the sale of the property to Metro for \$185,000. Don 2nd. Motion carried with Celia abstaining from the vote. Incorporation Status of Granges – About half of the Granges which had lost their corporation status are now up-to-date. Letters will be sent to those needing attention.

DECISIONS MADE BY E-MAIL:

- Authorization to allow Springwater to accept an offer of \$125,000 on the Colton-Foothills building.
- Decision to allow Springwater to explore the idea of carrying the contract on Colton-Foothills, making sure they received input from attorney on any possible drawbacks.
- Permission to allow Phoenix Grange to use some of its trust funds to apply for a matching grant from the Phoenix Urban Renewal Agency.
- > Permission for Lexington to withdraw \$5,648.52 from its trust fund for various projects.
- Permission for Lexington to withdraw \$165.00 from its trust funds to purchase new manuals.
- Decision to purchase new brochures and rip cards with payment coming from the Leadership/Membership Fund.
- > Permission for Sandlake to withdraw \$1,797.98 for windows and gutters/downspouts.
- > Re-authorization of the loan to National Grange and agreement to the promissory note.

MASTER'S REPORT:

<u>Columbia (Multnomah County)</u> – Susan has heard rumors about the possibility of this Grange closing. Kitty Thomas, who is serving as Multnomah County deputy, will follow-up on this. <u>Bellview</u> – Received a call about sponsorship of plays in the hall and if the Grange would be liable for any unpaid bills. Our attorney was contacted and said that an agreement must be in place.

<u>Dorena</u> – The BLM office in Lane County wishes to purchase a small strip of the property. Paperwork will be forthcoming.

<u>Elmira</u> – Delinquent in dues and loan payments. A new member might bring some energy into this Grange.

<u>Goshen</u> – Neighbor wants tree that is close to property line removed for his fence. Our attorney has been in contact with neighbor's attorney.

<u>North Fork</u> – Title report received. Still not conclusive about water rights. Attorney has been provided with name and address of person who granted the rights.

<u>Roxy Ann</u> – Declared dormant. Carol Everman has been down there to pick up charter and other items. Many want to rent the hall.

<u>South Fork</u> – Our attorney and their attorney have been in contact with one another. Our attorney waiting to hear back from their attorney.

<u>Multnomah Pomona</u> – Reorganization/revitalization meeting scheduled from 1:30 to 3:30 October 26th at Rockwood Grange.

<u>Jasper</u> – Settled for \$60,000 to \$65,000 with the Grange's insurance company having to pay ½ of this amount. Settlement down from the \$7 million originally requested.

<u>Retreat in Spring</u> – Possible Lecturer's retreat or maybe a retreat for whoever wants to attend. Lecture programs, writing resolutions, legislature, fundraising, membership, social events. Maybe in early March. Camp sites being checked on.

Executive Committee Meeting - January 17, 2015

The meeting was called to order by the Worthy Master Susan Noah and opened with a prayer by Don Sether. Present were Master Susan Noah, Overseer Celia Luttrell and members of the Executive Committee Malcolm Trupp, Don Sether and Roger Wilson.

Minutes

Minutes of pervious meeting were reviewed and one correction was made. Under a request made by Flora Cookie Trupp make a notation that there were no objections made if the Oregon State Grange paid for the 6th Degree formals up front to then be paid back by individual lady officers. A motion was then made by Malcolm Trupp and 2nd by Don Sether to adopt the minutes as corrected. Motion was then carried.

Financial Reports

Susan Noah announced that we would have speakers joining us later this morning; Kelly Bosch from Moss Adams, who has been doing our recent audits, as well as Scott Barker from Etesian Wealth Advisors who's handling our investments. Susan and Celia both spoke about the new Charles Schwab statements that we had been receiving on our investments. There are problems locating necessary information from these statements which we need in order to track and disburse realized gains. Celia may have to meet with the investment firm in order to complete the accounting from August onward. There are questions that have to be addressed about realized gains, especially in August. Susan also noted that \$75,000 had been transferred from the investment accounts to the Oregon State Grange checking account in order to cover year end obligations as well as the Grant Program disbursements.

Unfinished Business

The Worthy Master covered work that Steve Kroeker had been doing at the State Grange office in coordination with our attorney Nancy Murray on the restraint of title for properties held by Subordinate Granges. There are 10 counties that are now ready. She said that they are making good progress and getting some good information on various properties around the state. This work is being funded from the sale of the Lake Creek Grange property, which is now in the Reverted Grange funds. Susan hopes that this project will be completed early this year.

Matching Grant Program- Susan Noah went over the Oregon State Grange Grant Tracking form. This form summarized the Granges who were awarded these funds. The initial paperwork has been mailed out to each Grange and all have been returned with information on start dates of their projects. The report contained detailed information on money that has been disbursed to date. None of the quarterly reports for work completed have been received, but these should be starting to come in soon. The Executive Committee felt that this is going to be a very positive program for the Granges in Oregon.

Rose Espenshade will be joining us later today to discuss a sale of Grange property request so more information could be provided to the State Executive Committee.

New Business

Susan Noah reported on the Carver Mountain property. Buzi Nelson, a Granger and realtor in Clackamas County is working on the sale of this property. There have been quite a few showings and Buzi feels pretty good about an eventual sale. Buzi Nelson also submitted a written report on Crowfoot, Mud Springs and Highland. She is working on getting these all actively listed. Highland might pose some problems that may need to be addressed.

It was announced that Eva Frost, from Columbia County, would be the new State Grange Community Service Director.

The Worthy State Master reported that she had asked for a ruling from the National Master on what constitutes a couple for Family Membership purposes. This was then clarified in our bylaws before they were sent out to each Grange so that we would not be in conflict.

Suzy Ramm, Oregon Grange Bulletin Editor, would like to purchase Acrobat Pro. She is looking at not the most recent program, but an earlier version that would cost approximately \$400. The newest version would have to be bought on a monthly fee plan. This will help with clarity and appearance of the Bulletin in our final printed copy. A motion was made by Malcolm Trupp and 2nd by Don Sether to approve the purchase of Acrobat Pro for approximately \$400. After discussion the motion carried.

Kelly Bosch from Moss Adams, who is the accountant that has been working on our audit, was introduced to the committee. She distributed copies of the audit completed for year ended 12-31-2012 and 12-31-2013 as well as the Financial Statements. She reported they had filed two tax returns for us. She briefly outlined the team from Moss-Adams who has been working on our records. She said there were no significant weaknesses noted. Kelly said they should have a report ready to present at our State Grange Session. Recommendations that she shared were discussed. She stated that ours had been a clean audit and she was impressed and very pleased by how the books were structured and the reporting systems we use. There are sufficient checks and balances in our accounting that minimizes risk.

Kelly also went over the Financial Statements and accompanying notes. Appreciation for everything Moss-Adams and Kelly have done for us during this audit, including the review of our financial records, was expressed by the committee members. She was thanked for meeting with us today and we look forward to working with them in the upcoming year.

Meeting next with the committee was **Scott Barker from Etesian Wealth Advisors Inc**. who is acting as our investment advisor. It was noted our funds are still with Charles Schwab even though we have changed investment advisor companies. Susan Noah shared changes we might see in funds incoming from different property sales, and some funds that might have to be disbursed in the near future. Scott covered balances and activities over this past quarter. Scott also pulled addendum information to look at the market trends overall and how our investments are performing. He summarized individual funds and if there were any concerns in what we are currently holding. He said there do not appear to be any issues at this time. He had suggestions on how to improve and stabilize our financial outcome. There might be something we can do in the bonds we hold and perhaps to reduced our international and energy exposures should be considered. Discussion on how this might trigger income/loss, realized/unrealized gains was held. Discussion was also held on bonds holding and maintaining an AA rating. Scott recommended that we view the rating of our overall average be AA and not that each individual position be AA. Other investment strategies that would be in keeping with our investment policy were discussed.

Break for lunch

The meeting was called back to order by the Worthy Master. While the committee waited for the arrival of Rose Esbenshade from Sunnyridge Grange discussion on the property was held and specific questions that we might need answered. Joining the committee was Rose Esbenshade, who shared a potential agreement between the Grange and a local community member that they would like us to consider. The gentleman who is interested in buying the Grange building comes from a Grange family. He is interested in purchasing the building, doing necessary repairs that are badly needed, and letting the Sunnyside Grange use the hall as long as it exists as a Grange.

The agreement would have language that the buyer would retain ownership of the property and it would have their full unrestricted ownership once there was no longer a Sunnyridge Grange. The assessment of the Grange property was discussed. The Grange has the use of an older well now but the bathrooms aren't usable. Concerns were expressed about the limitations that this prospective buyer might be expecting that would vastly restrict the Grange's ability to grow and thrive. More information on the use and expectations of the potential buyer, and what he wants needs to be clarified. It was suggested that Susan Noah write a list of our concerns so that Rose could have these to open up a discussion with the buyer.

A motion was made by Malcolm Trupp and 2nd by Don Sether to accept the resignation of Phyllis Wilson as Oregon State Grange Secretary. Motion then carried. This position needs to be filled until the next State Grange Session. At that time an election will be held to fill this position for the remainder of the term. Discussion followed and names of members who had been approached that might have been able to perform the duties were shared. A motion was made by Roger Wilson to appoint Alice Nowicki from London Grange in Lane County to fill the position of Oregon State Grange Secretary until the Oregon State Grange elections in June. This motion was 2nd by Celia Luttrell and carried.

Geoff Horning, Executive Director of the Agri-Business Council of Oregon, met with the Executive Committee. He shared a PowerPoint presentation on the Adopt-A Farmer Program. He covered some history of the Agri-Business Council and outlined financial obligations their organization faces as the Adopt-A-Farmer Program has grown. They are currently reaching middle schools across the state and thousands of students. They are not only looking for donations but there are other aspects that the Grange and Granges around the state might be able to assist them with. Discussion on dissemination of information and becoming involved through monetary and non-monetary means were reviewed. Mr. Horning was thanked for giving us the time to be with us today and to educate us on what his organization and this specific program can accomplish.

A motion was made by Malcolm Trupp and 2nd by Don Sether that we donate \$2,500 to the Agri-Business Council of Oregon from the Leadership/Membership Fund for the Adopt A Farmer Program. Following discussion motion carried.

A suggested proposal from Jeff Dehne was reviewed on how to assist Granges that don't have a musician with a music system. It was noted that the National Grange already has available a digital CD of the Grange songbook. No action was taken at this time.

The Worthy Master outlined the calendar proposal that had been shelved for this year. She said that it had been proposed that calendar pages containing upcoming events could be mailed to each Grange with a suggestion that these be posted on their bulletin boards. Perhaps next year we could expand this idea into a full calendar.

Information on display boards were shared with the Executive Committee. These could be used for more than one event and allow us to share our Grange information in a more professional and useful way. A motion was made by Don Sether and 2nd by Malcolm Trupp to purchase 3 of the 6 sided folding fabric covered display boards with custom headers (cost approximately \$325 each). These funds to come from the Leadership/Membership fund. Following discussion this motion carried.

Decisions made via email were reviewed - These included:

- > Permission given to Dorena to sell a small parcel of land to Lane County for \$510.
- Permission given for the sale of the Colton-Foothills Grange hall (this deal eventually fell through).
- Granted request for the Keizer Grange for \$229.18 from their trust fund for electrical work.
- Agreement for Fernwood Grange to accept ODOT proposal of \$8,600 for sale of part of their property.
- > Acceptance of request by Lexington Grange for \$4,037 to update their furnace.
- Acceptance of Fruitdale Grange for \$3,500 from their trust funds for appliances and donation to be made to the Josephine Co. Fairgrounds for a cooling fan.
- Agreement by the Executive Committee to move our investment management to Etesian Wealth Advisor and to continue on with Scott Barker as our investment advisor.

Grange Reports

Roger Wilson reported that he and Gail had attended meetings of all of the Granges in Umatilla and Morrow Counties except Greenfield.

The Worthy State Master gave her report on Granges:

Columbia in Multnomah County- Cat Thomas has attended a couple of their meetings. They welcomed a new group of members in November and she is helping them with Grange work. **Goshen**- Nancy Murray, our attorney, is working with them on property issues. **North Fork**- Still no movement on this property.

Mapleton- Carol Everman, State Grange Deputy, also had a report on this Grange. They have some internal problems amongst the membership. Hopefully they can go forward together. **Roxy Ann**- Carol Everman submitted a report on this Grange. She said she went .to pick up the last of the Grange regalia and found a pipe had burst. The city has shut off the water but there is considerable damage to the hall. Wayne Cabler has the key to the front door and he is looking into costs for repairs. A motion was made by Don Sether and 2nd by Malcolm Trupp to have the plumbing repaired and then to wait until spring to address repairs to the sheetrock and insulation. Motion carried.

South Fork- This property sale has been completed. A check for \$34,087.50 was received and placed into a trust fund for them.

Strawberry Mountain- Susan Noah had received a call from the Master saying they were considering consolidation with Mt Vernon. When Derrell Witty, State Grange Deputy was also told, it might take a year for any of this to happen.

Valley Falls- Dusty Counts in Lakeview wants to lease this property to start a community center. The building is deteriorating. Someone in the area thought they had a claim on the building and our attorney at the time was consultee but there seems to be no notation in our files of what happened to this claim.

Multnomah Pomona- reorganization is scheduled for Sunday the 18^{III} at Sauvie Island Grange following the district meeting.

A proposal from Warren Grange was reviewed. They are asking for funds from their trust funds to build a new porch on the building they use on the Columbia County Fairgrounds. A motion was made by Don Sether and 2nd by Malcolm Trupp to accept the proposal contingent upon receiving a breakdown of costs prior to the funds being disbursed.

A proposal from Triangle Grange was reviewed. They would like to borrow \$40,000 for building repairs and updates. Discussion followed. A motion was made by Don Sether and 2nd by Malcolm Trupp to Ioan them funds at 5% interest amortized over 15 years (which would be monthly payments of approximately \$320) Motion carried.

The next meeting is scheduled for April 12th. The meeting following this will be June 6th. Meeting was adjourned 5 pm.

Executive Committee Meeting - April 12, 2015

The meeting was called to order at 9:10 a.m. on the above date by the Worthy Master Susan Noah. A quorum was declared. A prayer was given by Don Sether.

Present were Master Susan Noah, Overseer Celia Luttrell, Secretary Alice Nowicki and members of the Executive Committee, Malcom Trupp, Don Sether and Roger Wilson. Guests were Carol Everman, State Deputy, Clarann Witty, Chair of District 6 Hosting Committee, Derrell Witty State Deputy, and Scott Barker, Etesian Wealth Advisors.

Minutes

Minutes of the previous meeting were reviewed and one correction was completed. A motion was made by Malcom Trupp to adopt the minutes of the January 17, 2015 as corrected; seconded by Don Sether. Motion was then carried.

Financial Reports

Membership Reports were submitted by staff member, Jan Oleson, and reviewed by the committee. A discussion was held regarding Subordinate Grange's Quarterly Reports, Ioan and notes receivables, membership totals and dormant Grange expenses.

Investment Update

Celia Luttrell presented her report on Charles Schwab Investments. Celia Luttrell, Susan Noah, Scott Baker from Etesian Wealth Advisors and Kelly Bosch from Moss Adams will meet to receive and clarify the information on the Charles Schwab investments. This meeting will explain the realized gains so that an accurate report can be formulated. We need this information to handle other financial matters.

Scott Barker from Etesian Wealth Advisors distributed the first quarter investment report. Scott reviewed the report with the Committee. He presented and explained the factors that have a negative effect on the market and the gains and losses of our investment. He is not recommending any changes in the portfolio at this time. The Worthy Master Susan Noah advised Scott on our upcoming financial needs. It was determined that \$135,000.00 will be drawn from the Investment account and transferred to the Oregon State Grange checking account to cover current expenses.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Carver Mountain: We should be receiving the \$189,000. 00 on the closing date May 1, 2015. **Fair Oaks:** Roof has been replaced for the amount of \$8,265.00.

Title Work: Susan stated that she wants this project completed before State Session. She also thinks that we should file on the properties that we own. We can make title adjustments at a later date. Our attorney, Nancy Murray will be coming down on the April 21st to finish with the title work. A discussion was held regarding this title work. A motion was made by Celia Luttrell to proceed on April 27 to file with the title information that we have; seconded by Don Sether. Motion was carried.

Matching Grants: Information on the matching grant program was handed out by Susan. This information will be mailed out before the Oregon State Session. Brandon Grange inquired if a lease/rental property would be considered for the grant. Discussion was held on this point. Members felt that priority should be given to Grange owned properties. We need to update "the frequently asked questions" section to cover rental/leased property. Further discussion was held on the grant covering hall functionality and outward appearance. From this discussion it was determined that a definition of hall functionality and appearance should be in the grant information. Members were asked to review the grant information and submit changes and ideas to Susan.

NEW BUSINESS

Lexington Grange requested funds from their trust to replace septic tank at the cost of \$3.386.00 A motion was made by Malcom Trupp to approve the request for funds to replace the septic tank; seconded by Don Sether. Motion was carried.

Bellview Grange requested from their trust for reimbursement for stage extension, electrical work, new hall lighting and security lighting. The cost was \$4968.84. A motion was made by Malcom Trupp to approve their request; seconded by Celia Luttrell. Motion was carried.

Eastside Grange hall: A bid presented for the removal of the hall at the cost of \$49,714.00. Susan presented a report on the condition of the building. A discussion was held regarding the quote, environmental report, property and property taxes. A motion was made by Don Sether to approve the bid; seconded by Malcom Trupp. Motion was carried.

District 6 Session Clarann Witty, Chair of District 6 Hosting Committee, presented a report on the State Session preparations, schedule and meal costs. She announced that 200 handmade satchels have been made for delegates. The next meeting will be on April 21st at Missouri Flat.

LUNCH BREAK

The meeting was called back to order by the Worthy Master.

National Representative Discussion on the selection preference of National Lecturer, Legislative Director, High Priest or any other suggestions for National Representative. It was concluded that Susan will select someone.

Decisions made via e-mail

- New Pine Creek: It was voted to turn the property over to the fire department. (Update: the fire department declined the property due to asbestos issues.)
- > Fruitdale: It was agreed to send \$4,731.36 from their trust fund for tables and chairs.
- Sandlake: It was agreed to send \$3,636.61 from their trust fund for various repairs and maintenance
- Carver Mountain: It was agreed to accept the full price offer (\$189,000.00) for the Carver Mountain property with the condition of the septic inspection.
- > Colton Foothills: Agreement to the possible sale of the Colton Foothills building.
- > Fair Oaks: It was agreed to accept the lower bid of \$8,100.00 for roof replacement.
- Carver Mountain: Agreement to make a counter offer of \$ 175,000.00 on the first offer for the sale of the property. (Update: the buyers declined and deal fell through.)
- South Fork: Agreement on the bridge loan for South Fork as an option for them.
- Trailer for State Session: A motion was made by Celia Luttrell to ask Lane Pomona for their trailer at the cost of \$350.00 to move things to state session; seconded by Don Sether. Motion was carried.

Grange Reports

The Worthy Master Susan Noah presented a report on the following Granges:

- Goshen: There is still no resolution to this situation. The neighbor's attorney has asked for a mediator and Goshen has agreed to the process. The mediation will occur at the end of April first part of May.
- Goldson: A visit was made by Carol Everman, John Knox, Vernon and Paula Herrick, Mark and Susan Noah to assist them with some internal problems.
- > North Fork: Still no movement on this property
- Mapleton: Carol Everman, John Knox and Susan Noah attend their March 5th Grange meeting to assist the members with some communication problems.
- > Roxy Ann: Repairs still need to be made on broken pipes.
- > South Fork: No recent updates of the possible purchase of a building and several lots.
- Strawberry Mountain and Mt Vernon: Strawberry Mountain Grange voted to consolidate with Mt Vernon. Mt Vernon has yet to vote on the consolidation. Mt Vernon is facing the expense of replacing their septic tank and rebuilding their drain field. The State Grange has offered them a loan for these repairs.
- Multnomah Pomona: On January 18, 2015, members present at a meeting agreed to reorganize and elected a Master, Overseer, and a Secretary. On March 28, 2015 they disbanded.

OTHER BUSINESS:

Secretaries' Handbook: A revised copy of the Secretaries' Handbook should be available by the end of the month

"Get involved" pamphlet: This pamphlet is a generic program of all the different Grange committees. Each Grange will receive 10 pamphlets to use as an informational or promotional tool. Printing bids for the pamphlet were presented for discussion. A motion was made by Roger Wilson to accept the bid of \$1310.63 for 3000 to come out of Membership Leadership Fund; seconded by Don Sether. Motion was carried.

State Session Next Year: District one will host the State Session in 2016. No site has been selected as of yet. Susan is going to Azalea Grange meeting on May 9th to check on progress. A discussion of tentative schedule for the session was held.

State Session prices for meals: The Kick-off Banquet meal price will be \$19.50 for adults and \$9.00 for children up to 12. The Lunch meal price will be \$13.50 for adults and \$9.00 for children.
Display Boards: The display boards were purchased and will be used at State Session.
Budget Proposal: A discussion on staff wage increase was held. A recommendation will be presented to the budget committee to increase staff wages for 2016.

Malcom Trupp gave a report and update on Franklin Grange.

Carol Everman gave a report and update on Myrtle Grange, Goldson, and Lexington Grange. **Derrell Witty** gave a report and update on Liberty Grange, Hurricane Grange, Strawberry Mountain Grange, MT. Vernon Grange, Lexington Grange, Rockwell Union Grange, and Sprague Grange.

The next meeting of the Executive Committee will be held on June 6, 2015. Celia Luttrell made a suggestion that if it looks like a lengthy meeting to have an evening meal and that the starting time be adjusted.

Meeting adjourned at 4:31.

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Resolutions Approved at the 2015 State Session

Agriculture

AG #1: Aggregate Removal on Class 1 and 2 Farmland

Resolved: Before application for mining aggregate can be approved on high-value farmland, the Department of Agriculture and the Department of Water Resources should be required to examine the application and sign off on proposed mining operation that it will not impact agriculture operation and water rights on surrounding farms.

AG #3: Oppose Non-Transparent Trade Pacts

Resolved: That the Oregon State Grange opposes non-transparent, non-amendable fast-track trade pacts, which do not allow open debate by our legislative bodies.

By-Laws

BL #1: Final Delegate Election of State Grange Officers

- Resolved: That a sentence be added to Section 1.9.4 that says, "If no candidate for an office receives a majority of the votes cast, the names of the candidates for that office who receive the highest and the next highest votes shall be printed on the ballot." And be it further
- Resolved: That the second sentence of Section 1.10.2 be changed by replacing the words "name of the member who received the majority of the votes in the Preferential Election" with the words "names of the candidates" so that it reads, "The State Secretary shall prepare an Australian ballot with the names of the candidates and a space for the delegates to vote for other members if they desire."

BL #2: Family Membership

Resolved: That the Oregon State Grange By-laws Article 4 – Subordinate/ Community Granges, Section 1, Relation to State and National Granges, 4.4.3 be changed to read: "A family shall consist of a couple and their dependents, or a single person and their dependents. Dependents are defined as children, grandchildren, great grandchildren, foster, adopted or step-children under the age of 23, who live as a member of the same household or in absence due to illness, education or military service. Legal dependents of any age shall be considered part of their legal guardians' family."

Education

ED #1: Encourage the Study of Civics in Oregon Schools

Resolved: That The Oregon State Grange asks the State Board of Education to emphasize civics education at all levels of public education in Oregon. And be it further

Resolved:	That The Oregon State Grange ask the State Board of Education to declare
	that civics is an essential skill and require that students show proficiency in the
	subject to achieve an Oregon High School diploma.

Federal Affairs

FA #2: Executive Orders Can't Become Laws According to the U.S. Constitution

Resolved: The Oregon State Grange requests that U.S. Congress repeal the laws made by Executive Orders. If they will not do this, we request the-Supreme Court, through judicial review, to rule against these Executive Orders becoming law.

FA #3A: Keep Gateway Postal Facility Open

Resolved: That the USPS keep the Gateway Postal Facility in Springfield open.

FA #3B: Pre-Fund Retiree Benefits

Resolved: That Congress eliminate the requirement that USPS pre-fund retiree insurance benefits.

Good of the Order

GO #1: Grange and Drugs

Resolved: That the National Grange Digest of Laws be amended by inserting a new section following Chapter 10, Article 11 and renumbering the existing Article 12:

Illegal Drugs

10.12.1 All Granges are prohibited from allowing Schedule I drugs, as defined by the federal Controlled Substances Act (CSA), in a Grange hall or on any Grange property or at any Grange meeting in buildings or on property not owned by the Grange, and may not allow the presence of Schedule I drugs at any Grange meeting or event.

10.12.2 Section 1 of this Article shall apply to all Schedule II through V drugs as defined by the CSA, except those held in lawful possession as prescribed by a licensed physician.

10.12.3 No Grange shall allow on Grange property any other person to engage in activities that circumvents Section 10.12.1 or encourages the disregard of the CSA.

GO #2: Displaying the Oregon State Flag

Resolved: That our local, Pomona, and State Granges are encouraged to display the Oregon State flag at their hall and meetings. The Oregon flag will be placed between the stations of Secretary and the Graces thus showing that Granges strongly support both the United States and our State of Oregon.

Health & Welfare

HW #1: Mental Health Day

Resolved: The Grange will go on record to support WHO's (World Health Organization's) World Mental Health Day on October 10th of each year to help educate and support education on mental health.

HW #2: False Reports of Child Abuse

Resolved: That the Oregon State Grange advocates counseling for all family members until the guilt or innocence of the parent who is charged with child endangerment, sexual abuse, or kidnapping is determined.

Insurance

IN #1: Acupuncture Pain Relief

Resolved: That the Oregon State Grange requests that the National Grange lobby the medical insurance industry and Medicare insurance to change the rules and cover acupuncture treatment as a means to manage pain in all Americans covered by insurance.

Legislative

LE #1: Correct Laws on Non-Convicted Arrests

Resolved: That the Oregon Legislature change the law so that records of arrests not resulting in conviction shall only be available to law enforcement and officers of the court.

LE #3: Grange Hall Distances from Legal Marijuana Sales

Resolved: That the Oregon State Grange strongly oppose any marijuana stores or dispensaries near a Grange hall using the same zoning distances as schools or playgrounds in each jurisdiction.

LE #4: Elector Selection

Resolved: That the Oregon State Grange support any legislative or initiative measure that seeks to have the electors to the Electoral College be selected by the majority of voters of each Congressional district and two by the majority of voters of the entire state of Oregon.

LE #5: Opposition to Oregon's Senate Bill #941 as Relating to Firearms

Resolved: That the Oregon State Grange supports the right of the people to keep and bear arms. The Oregon State Grange will not support any gun laws that infringe upon these rights.

LE #6: Oppose House Joint Resolution 21, An Oregon State Property Tax Law

Resolved: The Oregon State Grange supports the right of the county voters to set their own tax base.

Transportation

TR #2: Stop ODOT Per Mile Tax

Resolved That the Oregon State Grange direct its lobbyist to oppose the Department of Transportation's efforts to implement a per mile tax.

Veterans

VT #1: World War II Veterans and Mustard Gas Exposure

Resolved: The Oregon State Grange supports legislation requiring the VA to assume that any World War II veteran that presents with any symptom linked with mustard gas exposure to be approved for veteran's health benefits within 180 days of the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) receiving application for health benefits due to their exposure.
